Obama's Lead Narrows, Especially with Key Groups: President Barack Obama's lead over Governor Mitt Romney fell eight points in the latest general election match-up in April's Pew Research for the People and the Press <u>survey</u>. Last month he was ahead of Mr. Romney by twelve points, 54%-42%, and now only leads by four, 49%-45%. These results are among a slew of other recent national <u>polls</u> showing Mr. Romney gaining momentum after Senator Rick Santorum suspended his campaign last week, effectively ending the GOP nomination fight and turning voters' attention to the general election.

The Pew results also show Mr. Romney closing the gap or taking the lead with a number of important voting groups. In March, Mr. Obama polled ahead with all of the groups listed below, but now Mr. Romney is in the lead with independents, men, voters 65 and older, voters with some college education, Catholics, and voters who make between \$30,000 and \$74,999 a year – all groups that will be critical come November.

Mr. Obama, on the other hand, has seen his percentage fall with several of his base 2008 voter blocs: he is down two points with young voters, six points with college graduates, eight points with Catholics, and five points with women and independents.

These voters have been losing favor with Mr. Obama since his inauguration, as his Gallup job approval <u>rating</u> is now below 50% with all but three of these groups.
